#### Interesting People - Meet Dog Lovers, Karen and Paul Hickman

Paul and Karen Hickman of Baden have always had dogs in their lives. Hemi, a large Black Lab, was part of their family for ten years. Just before Hemi passed on, they adopted Molly, who was a lab cross and was an incredibly smart dog. Molly could count up to seven with her paw and perform actions from cue cards, such as sit and roll over.

Next came Tundra, who was a German Shepherd that had once been trained to be a police dog, but didn't make the grade. Tundra was sold to a woman who basically kept him in a cage for two years. By the time the Hickmans adopted him, the 100 pound dog was down to 50 pounds with some severe medical issues. Over the next month Tundra was loved, fed puppy food, and gained 10 pounds. Unfortunately Tundra died two years later.

The next dog to come along was Jake, a Blue Heeler cross. Blue Heelers are a cattle dog mixed with a dingo and they are used as herders. They are also high energy dogs that want to go all day. Jake, the three year old heeler, died two years ago around Christmas time and Molly passed away in May of 2016.

Anyone who has owned dogs knows how devastating it is to lose not only one, but two pets, within a short time from each other. "It leaves a big hole in a person's heart," stated Paul. It is devastating and can shatter the family. The Hickmans noticed how quiet things were around the house and thought at one time they would get another dog, but they had a trip to Florida planned for that fall, so they decided to wait.

During a discussion with Leticia and Michelle at the Baden Vet Clinic, they were asked what type of dog they might eventually be interested in. Paul had been secretly researching Labs and German Shepherds, and was shocked when the ladies at the Baden Vet Hospital recommended Greyhounds.

Although Paul was somewhat taken aback by the suggestion, he did start researching the idea of adopting a Greyhound. Through his research he discovered that the Greyhounds are very social animals, very athletic, and are cared for extremely well during their racing time. They go back to the times of Ancient Egyptians and there are pictures on tomb walls to prove it. They have the same shape and muscle structure as a cheetah, and are very

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docile animals sleeping up to 18 hours a day—a forty mile an hour couch potato, as Paul says. Most hounds rely on their nose (scent) to get by, while Greyhounds rely on their vision. They can see up to one and a half miles away.

Paul and Karen were visiting her parents in London and on the return trip Paul mentioned that he'd made an appointment at the GRA Ingersoll—just to look at the dogs and collect information. The GRA Ingersoll takes care of adopting 120 to 160 dogs a year, and they are one of at least four adoption centres in Ontario. The Hickmans were armed with questions and were given the chance to take Memphis, one of the available dogs, for a walk. They fell in love with him, but Paul, being a logical person, suggested it was best to think about it. Oddly enough, they were about to pull back on the highway when a Greyhound bus drove by. They emailed that night and said they would take Memphis.

Greyhound racing is big in three states that the Hickmans know of—West Virginia, Florida, and Arkansas. Memphis had raced about 55 races; he won a few and lost a few. The dogs start racing at age 18 months to a maximum of five years old when they are retired. They can be retired for a number of reasons—declining speed is one of them. The normal speed for a Greyhound is 39.5 miles an hour and Memphis was slowing down, so he was retired. He began racing at Florida and finished his career at Southland

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Race Track in West Memphis, Arkansas. Disliking his racing name, Dawnzee, the Hickmans decided that Memphis would be an appropriate name for their new pet. It was an experience trying to bring their new addition into their home. Greyhounds have never lived inside a home. They had to train him to do his business outside and it took over a week for the dog to go upstairs.

That fall was their trip to visit the parents in Florida. A Greyhound race track is located in Orlando, which was an hour and a half away, so they decided to visit a track and see how the dogs are cared for. They were impressed with what they saw, as they were given a "behind the scenes" tour of the racing facility and dog kennels. The dogs live in 4 x4 crates which they love, and are cooled down in a pool after each race. The first race of the ten for that day is always the maiden race for many dogs; they run one to five races to see if they are capable of being a good racer. That is where the Hickmans first saw Dutch Wren.

Dutch Wren is a smaller female with similar markings to Memphis. "Wouldn't it be wonderful if we could adopt a similar looking dog?" mused Karen. The race began and all of the dogs were in a pack—except for Dutch Wren, who ended up dead last. They asked the trainer if she could be pre-adopted and the trainer replied, "Take her please."

About seven months later, Dutch Wren, whose name has been now shortened to Wren, was at the GRA in Ingersoll ready for pickup. The Hickman family is



now complete and the dogs are happy to be living with them in Baden. There are many Facebook pages available for Greyhound owners where information can be shared. The GRA in Ingersoll is now changing its adoption strategy and focusing on fostering Greyhounds. The Hickmans will be looking after two more dogs as the dogs await new owners. They are excited to help out in the process. The Hickmans believe that a Greyhound would be a perfect pet for a senior citizen, as they are docile and very loving animals. Paul believes that some Greys would make great therapy dogs.

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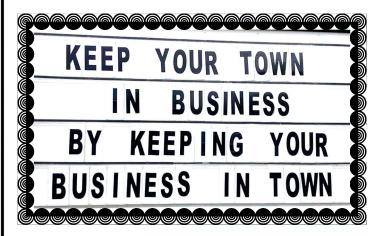


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### Baden ~ Our Town

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#### Baden Birding ~ White-Breasted Nuthatch

I enjoy walking on the trail in Schmidt's Woods, adjacent to The Wilmot Recreation Centre, several times a week. I see a number of birds there, including the White-breasted Nuthatch (WBNU). Ken recently wrote about the Red-breasted Nuthatch, so I thought I would write about the WBNU.



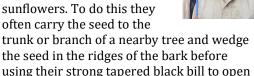
The WBNU is a small sparrow-sized bird with a black cap, white face and breast, with grayish-blue back and tail. The beak is black and strongly tapered. More about the beak later. The Red-breasted Nuthatch is slightly smaller in size, making it easier to distinguish the two species.

There are a number of ways to spot nuthatches. One way is to hear their distinctive "Yank Yank" call. The other is to see a small gray-blue bird heading DOWN a tree trunk HEADFIRST. This is a definite nuthatch characteristic. It is thought that by looking in the furrows and ridges of the bark from the top down instead of from the bottom up as do most other tree climbing birds, nuthatches see things from a different perspective and find food that other species may overlook.

Nuthatches eat a variety of food including: nuts such as Beechnuts and acorns, berries, fruits and seeds, and insects in various stages of development (eggs, larvae, pupae and adult). Being winter residents, nuthatches are attracted to our feeders by the seeds, along with the suet. They use

their stout tapered bills to crack open the shell cases of seeds such as acorns and sunflowers. To do this they often carry the seed to the



the seed case: hence the name Nuthatch. Or

they may just use the platform of the feeder if there is one. If there is an excess of seeds, the WBNU may cache some in the rough bark of a tree, which they may or may not remember doing.

WBNU are cavity nesters and may excavate a cavity in a

tree with a rotted knothole, or they may usurp an old woodpecker cavity. They may lay 10 - 12 eggs in a fibre lined nest. Both parents assist in the feeding of the young. They are a definite benefit to the forest, removing insects that may attack trees and spreading seeds around in their droppings. And I love hearing them and seeing them on my winter walks.

If you are walking on the trail in Schmidt's Woods, there are two birds that may look similar: the Black-capped Chickadee and the aforementioned Red-breasted Nuthatch. Both are sparrow-sized with black on the heads and grey

bodies. As previously mentioned, the RBNU is smaller than the other 2 species, has a reddish-brown breast and a black line through the eye with white above and below. The BCCH is more grey than blue and plumper than the WBNU. (photos American Expedition)





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## Cooking Safety

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity, and can

be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries?



In 2011-2015, unattended cooking was the number one cause of fires; in Canada, 33% and in the United States, 47%.

In one of every five (20%) of all reported home fires, unattended cooking was by far the leading contributing factor in these fires and in fire casualties.

By following a few safety tips you can prevent these fires:

- -Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, take something with you such as a spatula, towel, or oven mitts to remind you that the oven is in use. Never leave the house without turning off the oven.
- -Keep anything that can catch fire (oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels, or curtains) away from the stovetop.
- -If you have a small grease fire and decide to fight the fire:
- -On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner if you can. Leave the lid on till completely cooled.
- -For an oven fire, turn the heat off and keep the door closed.
- -If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire... Just *get out*! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire. Call 9-1-1 from outside your home and go to your meeting place.

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Prevention Odds and Ends

- ⇒ Unplug small appliances (toaster, coffee maker, kettle) when not in use. Fires have started in these appliances when plugged in and not in use.
- ⇒ Check Health Canada website for recalls: www.consumerinformation.ca
- ⇒ Clean dryer lint trap before each use.
- ⇒ Make sure all outside vents are clear of snow and ice.
- ⇒ Ensure smoke and carbon monoxide alarms are installed in the correct location and working as intended. Test monthly and change batteries at least once per year.
- $\Rightarrow$  Burn candles on noncombustible surfaces

#### Conclusion

This will be my last article as I have decided to join St Mary's Fire Department as their new Fire Prevention Officer. #### DID YOU KNOW THAT DOGS AREN'T ALLOWED IN ANTARCTICA?

Sled dogs are an important part of the history and exploration of Antarctica. Roald Amundsen used sled dogs to reach the South Pole in 1911. Robert Scott and Ernest Shackleton both tried using sled dogs in Antarctica,



but met with less success than Amundsen. Hundreds of other expeditions have used sled dogs here throughout the years. But, many people do not know that sled dogs are no longer allowed on the continent. Back in the 1980s the Environmental Protocol (conservation of Antarctic plants and animals) called for all non-native species, except humans, to be removed from Antarctica. The dogs had to be removed from Antarctica by April of 1994. This ban was introduced due to concerns that the dogs might transfer diseases such as canine distemper to the seal population. It was also a concern that the dogs might break free and disturb the wildlife. That was certainly the end of an era.

*Armand says* – Great question Abby! This house is known today as "Mill Pond" because the original deed described it as being on a mill pond lot. As a child I remember the Mill Pond being on both sides of the bridge on Foundry Street and skating on that particular part of the pond. The house was built in 1888 by Noah Cressman and sold in 1896 to Fred Holwell. Livingston Presbyterian Church purchased the property in 1979 and used it as a parsonage. When it was sold to the current owners, the money from the sale went toward church renovations.

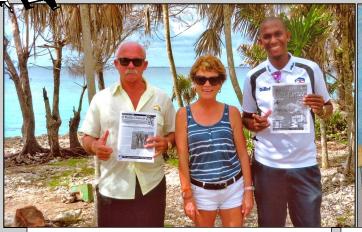

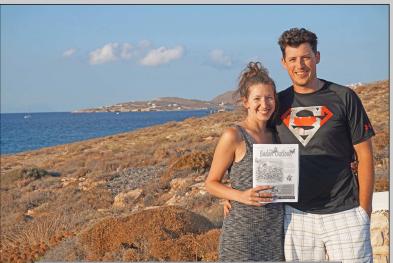

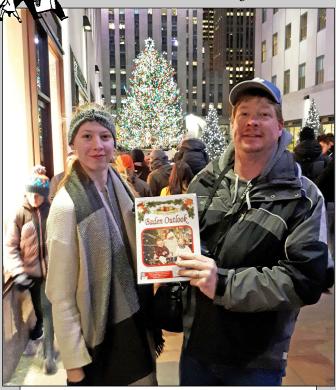

soups to start you off on the right foot this year. Enjoy!

#### Cabbage Roll Soup

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 lb ground beef
- 1 yellow onion, chopped
- 2 carrots, chopped
- 5 cups cabbage, chopped or sliced
- 3 garlic cloves, finely minced
- 3 1/2 cups beef broth
- 28 oz can diced tomatoes
- 2 tbsp brown sugar
- 1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp paprika
- 1 tsp oregano
- 1 tsp thyme
- 2 bay leaves
- 3/4 cup rice
- 1/3 cup chopped parsley

Salt and pepper to taste

In large stock pot, heat oil and add ground beef to brown. Add onions, carrots, garlic, and cook to soften onions. Add all ingredients except last 3 and bring to boil. Add rice and cook until rice is softened. Add lemon and parsley and enjoy with good bread for dipping!!

#### Turkey Dinner Soup

- 2 cups chopped or shredded turkey
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion diced
- 2 carrots diced
- 2 potatoes cut into bite sized pieces
- 1 cup peas
- 6 cups turkey or chicken broth
- 2 cups cream or milk
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 tsp dried thyme
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Leftover stuffing
- Cranberry sauce

Heat olive oil in large stock pot, add onions and carrots and cook until onions are softened, remove from pot and set aside. Melt butter in same pot, add flour and thyme and cook for 2 minutes. Add 1 cup of broth, whisking to avoid lumps to make a paste. Slowly add rest of broth and milk, stirring constantly. Return onions/carrots to pot and add potatoes and turkey. Cook until potatoes are softened, about 20 minutes. Add peas to heat through. Serve with crumbled stuffing and a dollop of cranberry sauce on top.

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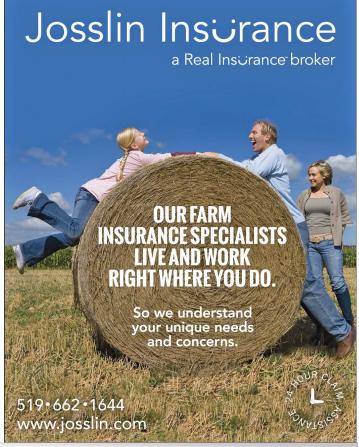
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#### EXERCISE AND OVER-TRAINING SYNDROME

Many individuals strive to incorporate more exercise into their daily routine and for good reason. Regular exercise has long been identified as an essential element of good health due to its ability to positively affect every organ and structure in the body. However, if



done in excess, exercise can also lead to negative health consequences such as **over-training syndrome (OTS)**.

OTS occurs when there is an imbalance between exercise training and the body's ability to recover. This typically occurs when exercise *volume* (the total amount of exercise performed) and/or *intensity* (the total amount of effort exerted) are too high for an extended period of time. Therefore, it is important to find the correct balance between exercise *volume* and *intensity*. A good exercise program should allow you to exercise on a regular basis without "burning out".

It is important to recognize the signs and symptoms of **OTS** which may include:

- **Performance related issues such as**: decreased strength, endurance, and power; poor workout recovery; an inability to complete workouts.
- Physical symptoms such as: an increased resting heart rate; persistent aches and pains in muscles and joints; repetitive strain injuries.

• Health related symptoms such as: frequent headaches; chronic fatigue; gastrointestinal distress; menstrual irregularities; decreased recovery from and/or increased susceptibility to colds, sore throats, and other illnesses.



• Mood and behavioural changes such as: insomnia; loss of appetite; increased irritability; depression; decreased motivation to exercise.

Below are some useful tips that can help overcome or minimize the chance of **OTS**:

- 1. Rest is essential for recovery. This may include absolute rest from all exercise activity or increasing the recovery time between exercise bouts. Proper rest allows for the body's important biological systems to recover, repair and recharge.
- 2. Change your training method. Look at the cumulative stress of the exercises performed. Use a variety of exercises when training specific body regions and avoid continuous training without proper recovery. Change your program frequently and find the right balance between exercise *volume* and *intensity*.
- 3. Check your nutritional status. Your body needs the proper nutrients to function optimally. Inadequate intake of carbohydrate and protein can lead to muscle fatigue and poor muscle tissue repair. Healthy fats are needed to produce hormones that regulate many body functions. Dehydration can contribute to muscle cramping and joint pain. Avoid nutrient deficient foods such as trans-fats and refined sugars and starches which put physical stress on the body.
- **4. Get professional help:** Overcoming **OTS** is not always simple. There are healthcare practitioners who can treat physical injuries and provide advice on nutrition and proper exercise training techniques.

Recognizing the signs and symptoms of **OTS** and knowing how to avoid or minimize its effects can ensure that you can continue to enjoy the many health benefits exercise has to offer. For additional information on exercise, nutrition, and improving your physical health, visit **www.nhwc.ca**.

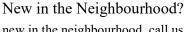

#### Verbal Abuse:

#### **Emotional abuse:**

- \* More subtle, but even more damaging.
- \* Implied messages that you are not good enough, important, competent, intelligent, or lovable.
- \* Suggestions that there is something wrong with you and that you have no value.

#### Financial abuse:

- \* Control of another's money and economic resources.
- \* Refusal to allow any input and control about how and where money is spent.
- \* Refusal to give the other person the money they need for personal necessities.
- \* Refusal to let the other person know about their finances.
- \* Demands that the other hand over their pay cheque without explaining where money is going.

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#### Interesting People ~ Meet Earl of Laverty Log Homes and Timber Frames

By now everyone must have seen the log home that is under construction near the corner of Sandhills Road and Gingerich Road. It is developing into an impressive structure, so the Baden Outlook stopped in to see Earl, owner of Laverty Log Homes and Timber Frames, to find out more about the building, the process, and his company.

arl Laverty always enjoyed the look and feel of log homes, so he took a four week log home construction introductory course in Alberta. Upon returning to Ontario, he started as an apprentice with Sunstream Log Homes, which was situated in Thorndale. Here he worked with an experienced log builder from Smithers, B.C. and a Master Timber Framer who learned his craft in Germany.

Over the next couple of years Earl worked for three different log home companies, where he became educated in the craft by learning from others and gaining experience firsthand through hard work.

In 2005 Earl started Laverty Log Homes and Timber Frames Inc., which was located near West Montrose. Earl rented space from a farmer, who also had a saw mill on the property. He wanted to move his business closer to the Wilmot area, so in 2015 he started

renting space at his current location in Baden. He currently has six employees, and generally builds two log homes a year.

The current project is the equivalent of close to five homes, a commercial banquet hall for the Killarney Mountain Lodge. Two thirds of the building (banquet hall A) is being built by his crew, while banquet hall "B" is being built by a log home construction company from Strathroy. When the buildings are complete they will have 10,000 square feet of space, a full basement, and a commercial kitchen built in between the two buildings. This building when complete will be the second largest log home ever built in Ontario and the largest log structure in the world to be built this year!

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trailer loads of logs just to build the walls, and the banquet hall "B" project will require 9 tractor trailer loads.

Together both projects will require 8 trailer loads for the roofing system. If maintained properly, this building will last over 1000 years, according to Earl. Earl also states that log

homes are more energy efficient than R2000 homes, mainly due to the thickness of the wood.

Ninety per cent of the building process is done in the yard in Baden, and the other ten per cent is putting all the marked and numbered pieces together at the building site. All pieces are shipped to the building sites via tractor trailers.

White Pine logs account for 75% of the construction, while the other 25% are Douglas Fir and Red Cedar. The sixty foot logs are laid on stands in the yard and the outer bark is stripped off



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by hand with a bark spud—which looks like an ice scraper for the driveway. Below the bark is a layer called cambium, which is somewhat brownish in colour. This layer is removed with a draw knife, which is a large two-handed blade. This is an important step as this is the finish that everyone will see and it must be neat and tidy.

The next step is to scribe and notch each end, to create what is called a saddle notch, where the logs will interconnect. Also, a notch is cut out of the bottom of the length each log (this notch is called a Swedish cove). When the building is assembled, a gasket is added to either side of the Swedish cove, which seals the logs together. It is important to shape all of the pieces correctly so that all pieces are level and plumb. Spaces are also cut out for





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windows and doors. Roofs are almost always made from the material of the walls. For example, if the walls are logs then the roof trusses will be round. If the walls are flattened logs than the trusses on that building will be square timbers.

Earl sits on the board and is past Vice President of the International Log Builders Association. He helped create the Effectives Practices and Methods of Hand Crafters and Log Builders book which is the self-imposed building standard for the industry. He is also a member of the Timber Framers Guild. Log building isn't rare in Canada, but it also is not that popular. Still, there are over 300 log builders in Canada. Earl has built homes in most of Canada and would someday like to enter the American market.

Earl is happy to be a part of the community in Wilmot and lives in Haysville with his wife and four daughters.

With winter here, gardeners have time to reflect on what was successful in last year's garden and what we would like to modify this year. Winter is a great time for planning. Keep an eye on your houseplants for pests (those sneaky guys can replicate quickly) and keep watering to a minimum.



Keep fit and stay active so your body is geared up for spring gardening! Lots of options but walking is the easiest and the Wilmot Rec Center has a great track for walking when the weather is nasty and sidewalks/roads are treacherous. Keep moving!

**SECRET LIVES OF TREES!** More amazing revelations appear every year as botanists study trees. In the boreal forest for example, there is a botanical community working together. Trees share resources, fight animal predators, change weather and help other species reproduce. The feathery moss that grows beneath the black spruce keeps the tree roots cool while the tree provides shade for the moss. During a drought, in the event of a fire, the moss spreads the fire right up to the tree canopy. Fire melts the wax on the cones which releases the seeds for reproduction.

**I'm thirsty!** The underground network of the interlinked tree roots share water and nutrients. If some of the trees need something, it is transported to them.





The white spruce's enemy is the red squirrel, which eats the seeds the trees need for reproduction. The trees coordinate lowering cone reproduction some years so that the number of squirrels is decreased. Then a bumper crop year comes so there is a surplus of seeds to ensure reproduction as the squirrels are overwhelmed with volume of seeds.

How do trees change weather? The trees release chemical compounds called terpenes, which float into the air in large quantities. "We recognize these terpenes as that 'fresh cut pine' scent, but their effects are much more influential than a scented breeze. As the molecules float up towards the sky, they collect other molecules like ozone on the way. Once big enough, water vapour condenses on these particles, and clouds are born. Trees create the weather they want - and the clouds they seed can influence the weather across the entire northern hemisphere." <a href="http://www.cbc.ca/natureofthings/features/canadas-boreal-forest-is-a-thriving-social-community-of-trees-that-work-tog\_">http://www.cbc.ca/natureofthings/features/canadas-boreal-forest-is-a-thriving-social-community-of-trees-that-work-tog\_</a> In many countries around the world, by cutting thousands of hectares of forest, humans have changed the weather, typically resulting in arid conditions.
